Already I have been impressed by the achievements of the students here and by the culture of the school, some examples of which you can read about in this edition. The introduction of PROUD Thursdays where students can share their best work with senior staff has been a superb innovation, as has the Golden Ticket awards scheme which I was fortunate enough to see in action just before Christmas. It has also already been a joy to hear year 7 recite the Filey song whilst at the other end of the school I have seen the immense efforts being made to support our year 11s as we push towards their terminal exams in May / June.

I hope you will enjoy reading about the exploits of the staff and students below and I look forward to many successful years of collaboration with our students, staff, carers and community.




Our Year 7 netball team played their first ever competitive fixture for Filey School. The girls played fantastically with player of the match Lola S.

As a school we continue to improve our communication channels. Our most important channel is the one between the school and our parents / carers. We are constantly exploring ways to improve this


