Science at Hogwarts

Ebor Academy Filey was transformed into Hogwarts for a science inspiration day involving the area's primary school pupils.

Some 150 children took part in three of the 12 hands-on Harry Potter-themed workshops, planned and delivered by members of the Ebor teaching team.

Enthusiastic junior wizards investigated floating liquids

in potions class and made their own bubbling lava lamps. Other workshops involved flying broomsticks, making colour changing cup-holders, investigating frozen hands and designing, making and tasting their own magical herbal tea.

Ebor Academy Filey is set to become a lead school in the delivery of the science curriculum. Our new team of professionals are keen to

share their skills and love for the subject.

"We are creating a science department that will enthuse the next generation of scientists," said Mr Andrew Galbraith, Headteacher.

"This unique opportunity enabled students to see science as a lively, engaging subject which they will develop further when they move into secondary school."

Lots of activity planned for future

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We have had a really busy first half term. I visited Year 7 at Lakeside on their residential visit, attended the Sea Cadets Inspection, visited a number of our partner primary schools, held our first open evening, Macmillan coffee morning and Year 6 "Harry Potter" themed science day. We have also built new links within the community to help further develop the provision for students.

Mr Andrew Galbraith is the first headteacher of Ebor Academy Filey, which replaces Filey School.

Mr Galbraith was formerly deputy headteacher at Knowsley Park School in Prescot, Merseyside.

He said: "This is a fantastic opportunity to make a real impact on the community. I am both excited and privileged to be leading Ebor Academy Filey into a new chapter in Filey's education history."

Richard Ludlow, CEO and executive headteacher for York-based Ebor Academy Trust, which runs the school, said: "Andrew brings energy, enthusiasm and an obvious passion for education. I am thrilled he has joined us at exactly the right time and I look forward to working with him."

This is Mr Galbraith's first headship. A keen sportsman and cyclist, he previously

visited Filey as a teenager on a rugby tour.

He has ten years' experience as a school

governor which he credits as valuable experience to understand the impact a school has on a community.

"I am a parent myself so I fully understand why a good education is important," he said.

Roles for all in family service dining

Family service dining at lunchtimes is one of the ways we help students bond with one another. It is all about instilling good manners and helping

others. It is a time when every single student has a job to do – laying the table, serving food, or clearing away at the end.

Family service dining was

introduced for Years 7/8, replacing a canteen culture where students leave their trays behind, expecting an anonymous cleaner to clear up after them. Here, they demonstrate kindness and a sense of responsibility.

Teachers eat with the students and play a special role in helping them develop the art of conversation at the table.

Understanding each others' needs and getting along with other people is an important skill which we are fostering with our students. We need to prepare our young people for employability, and

being able to communicate effectively with a range of people will give our students a head start on that journey.

"I would urge all parents or carers to take the opportunity to visit the school, to observe lessons, to stay for family lunch and to see for yourselves how much students enjoy both lessons and lunch and how much they learn every single day," said Headteacher Mr Andrew Galbraith. "I guarantee you will be immensely proud of your sons and daughters and their developing maturity."
